In 1984, Kim also completed a Honours Specialist in Geography at the University of Toronto.

Kim taught Geography and Math at Lord Elgin High School (starting in 1981), Lester B. Pearson High School (starting in 1982), and Burlington Central High School (starting in 1989). All within the Halton Board of Education. She also briefly taught at Bloor Collegiate and Vocational School of the Toronto Board in 1982.

Kim settles into her Burlington Apartment on Guelph Line Road, just north of New Street. Kim moved to her house on Woodland Ave. in 1992.

At the Halton Canadian Cancer Society Relay for Life, with a team of special friends and family. An opportunity to fund raise and celebrate our community of survivors.


Themed as the Wallace Waves, niece Megan (third from right) made wave shorts and shark beanies.

Kim co-authored three geography textbooks—Canadian Geography: A sense of place, Physical Landscapes of the Earth, and This Earth.

She was elected as a fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society (RCGS) in 2012 for her outstanding contributions in the classroom, school board, provincial, and national levels. She was an active member of the Ontario Association for Geographical and Environmental Education and received their Award of Distinction in 2018.



She was the inaugural RCGS Louie Kamookak Medal recipient for her work to strengthen geographic education and raise public awareness about the importance of geographical literacy.

In a 2018 article (linked below), Kim is described as "a true geography heroine in Canada."

Kim, at brother Greg's front yard, celebrating niece Megan's wedding day.


Together, Megan, with niece Sasha, Kim and nephew Aaron relive their skating glory days.


